Eating or Feeding?



Food for Thought, Bread for the World letterwriting campaign, CROP Hunger Walk, I Can Sunday collections for Crooked Creek Food Pantry, serving meals at Wheeler Mission, Pastors' Fund grocery gift cards, Fellowship meals and events, weekly Communion... clearly we care about food around here, and we like that!

To eat is a basic need of all living things. Nothing in this world, every human included, has been created to be completely self-sufficient. We cannot get by on our own. We all need other living, growing things to survive; the food we eat is made of them! Think about the interconnectedness of nature that we see in food chains and ecosystem webs. Human communities work in the same way; to eat is to be connected with something else. When we eat the body and blood of Christ in Holy Communion we are connected in an incredibly unique way with God, all people, and all creation. This meal is at the heart of all else we do as a church. We are fed and nourished for ministry—to feed others and to foster more connections.

When we first came to Pleasant View someone said,

"We're a church that likes to eat!" But, we're also a church that feeds, and that is evident in our passions and ministries. But where are we on the food chain? Are we somewhere near the top, consuming more than we give? Are we near the bottom, giving a lot but not being sustained by much? Somewhere in the center is the healthy place for us as a church and each of us individually. Are you allowing yourself to be fed enough for adequate ministry? Are you allowing yourself to give enough to adequately satisfy the needs of others?

Throughout the Summer, we have been praying the following after Communion at the 9am service:

Jesus Christ, host of this meal, you have given us not only this bread and cup, but your very self, that we may feast on your great love. Filled again by these signs of your grace, may we hunger for your reign of justice, may we thirst for your way of peace, for you are Lord forevermore. Amen.



What: FLEECE TIED BLANKETS!

Why: Because they are warm, sturdy and a snap to make! No sewing required!

Who: This project is great for any group that wants to provide gifts of comfort and warmth to those in need. It's an especially great activity for Sunday school classes, youth groups, Vacation Bible School classes and intergenerational groups.


MATERIALS:

- Two pieces of fleece 58" 59" wide x 80" long*
- Ruler
- · Chalk or fabric pen
- · Sharp fabric scissors

INSTRUCTIONS:

- Place the first piece of fleece with the right side (with the brightest pattern or finish) DOWN. Layer the second piece on top of it, with the right side UP. Smooth the layers together so they lie flat. Edges and corners don't need to match exactly.
- Using the ruler and fabric pen, mark a line 3" 3 ½" from the edge of the fabric all the way around.
- Out out a square at each corner and discard. Out tabs from the edge of the fabric to the line, about 1" - 1 ½" apart, through both pieces of fleece.
- Tie the top and bottom pieces of fleece together using the pairs of tabs you just cut. Use a secure double-knot, but don't pull too tight and stretch or tear the fleece.
- 6 Check to be sure that the tabs are not longer than 2" long; trim any that are.

*IMPORTANT: Check out LWR's fabric guidelines at lwr.org/getinvolved/assembly to ensure your gifts of love can reach the hands that need them.



Some important guidelines to remember:

- * Fleece typically comes in widths of 58" or 59". If you buy fleece from a fabric store, you can ask them to cut the length to 80", saving you the step of measuring and cutting the pieces yourself.
- * Please do not donate items with any religious symbols, messages or your group's name.
- Please do not donate any items decorated with a U.S. flag, patriotic or military symbols, or references to the armed forces, including camouflage.

An Upcoming Embroiderers' Guild Event:

The members of the Indianapolis Chapter of Embroiderers' Guild of America and I would like to invite you to our annual <u>Stitcher's Garage Sale on Saturday</u>, <u>August 12, 2017</u> at Pleasant View Lutheran Church. Doors will open at 10:00 AM. We are a group of women who meet regularly to learn, practice, study, and research the art of needlework. There are too many forms of needlework to name them all. Our members enjoy doing count cross stitch, needlework (canvas work), hardanger, quilting, crochet, embroidery, beading and fiber arts.

Our sale will include fibers—yarn, all types of crochet and embroidery floss and quilting threads. We will have a variety of fabrics—quilting, linen, silk, and various types and sizes of canvas. We have a large collection of individual patterns for all types of needlework and books of patterns and designs for sale. Three hundred quilting magazines in excellent condition have been donated. We have over 100 kits—some have never been opened; others have projects that have been started and for some reason, abandoned!

We also have a large assortment of needlework necessaries such as scissors, needles, frames, thimbles, etc. Baskets, decorative boxes and metal containers to help you organize and keep your projects together will be available. A large collection of picture frames have been donated, including a few antique frames. We have lamps, lights, floor craft frames, stitch scroll frames and stretcher bars.

This year finished needlework pieces will be available for sale. Some members pick projects to learn certain stitches or techniques. Once these projects are finished, they have no desire to keep them. These orphans have been donated for sale. There will be a silent auction where you can bid on more specialized finished pieces.

Please come and visit our Stitcher's Sale. If you are unfamiliar with our various forms of needlework, many of our members will be available to answer your questions—just ask anyone wearing our guild name tags. Payment for purchases can be made either by cash or check. Thank you.
